REGISTERING IF YOU COME FROM A FUROPEAN UNION COUNTRY

You will follow the same procedures as a French student. The following are considered "European" students, students with nationality from:

- one of the member countries of the European Union,
- one of the countries in the European Economic Area (EU + Norway, Iceland, Liechtenstein),
- Switzerland, Monaco or Andorra.

REGISTERING IF YOU'RE NOT EUROPEAN AND YOU'RE NOT FROM A COUNTRY COVERED BY "ÉTUDES EN FRANCE"

If you are a non-European and do not reside in a country covered by the "Études en France" procedure, and you wish to enter the 1st year of a course in France, you must apply for Prior Request for Admission (known

as Demande d'admission préalable or DAP in French). To do this, you must submit your application to the cooperation and cultural action department of the French embassy in your country of residence.

Students who are resident in Europe but who are not European citizens must submit an Application for Prior Request for Admission

COMING TO WORK IN FRANCE

GOOD TO KNOW

- Learning French: Although some jobs may not require a high level of French, improving your language skills can make your job search and your experience in France much easier.
- **Some sectors are recruiting :** Certain sectors such as entertainment and tourism, the hotel and catering industry and agricultural work often recruit seasonal workers, including international students.
- If you're looking **for work**: 2p30 Use specialised online platforms, company websites and professional networks to find job offers tailored to students.

KNOWING YOUR RIGHTS AS A WORKER IN FRANCE

Minimum wage:

Find out more about the <u>SMIC</u> (Salaire minimum interprofessionnel de croissance) or minimum wage to make sure you are paid fairly.

Social protection and healthcare:

As a European student, you can benefit from student social security (p23) for your healthcare in France. The European Health Insurance Card is also important.

WORKING IN FRANCE IF YOU COME FROM A EUROPEAN UNION COUNTRY

There are various stages and important considerations if you come to work in France from another European country.

Checklist of documents to be prepared

- CV and covering letter: Adapt your CV and covering letter to French standards. It can be useful to have them revised by a native speaker or a professional (a native speaker of French).
- Employment contract: Understand the different forms of employment contract in France (fixed-term (CDD), open-ended (CDI), etc.) and the associated working conditions.

FINDING SUPPORT



WORKING IN FRANCE IF YOU COME FROM A COUNTRY OUTSIDE THE EUROPEAN UNION

There are certain visa and work requirements to consider if you come to work in France as a non-European.

Check your visa status:

• Student visa and right to work:

If you are an international student(p.32) from outside the European Economic Area (EEA), your student visa generally allows you to work up to 964 hours a year in France, i.e. around 20 hours a week during the school year, subject to the specific rules linked to your visa.

• Residence permit:

If you wish to work in France, you will need a residence permit stating that you are entitled to work. Check with the prefecture or campus France for your country.

Checklist of documents to be prepared

- CV and covering letter: Prepare a CV and covering letter that reflect French expectations. Writing support services may be available at your university.
- Legal documents: Prepare a copy of your residence permit, your student visa and any other necessary documents proving your right to work in France.

2 ACCOMMODATION





GOOD TO KNOW

- It is essential to have accommodation as it gives you a postal address, which you will be asked to provide for most of the formalities involved in coming to France, particularly when applying for social security, setting up a bank account, or renewing your residence permit.
- It is compulsory to have a French bank account in order to receive housing benefit, for example.
- Start looking at least 3 months before your arrival. Note that social landlords have lengthy procedures that may require you to take action even earlier. It's worth noting that it's difficult to find accommodation at the start of the university year, as there is a lot of demand for the same type of accommodation at the same time.
- A landlord may ask you for a security deposit (also known as a "caution") equivalent to two months' rent for furnished accommodation and one month's rent for unfurnished accommodation. This sum serves as a guarantee for the landlord in the event of unpaid rent or damage to the property when you leave.
- As soon as the lease has been signed, you can start applying for health insurance, housing benefit from the CAF and compulsory home insurance.

> FINDING A GUARANTOR

GOOD TO KNOW

- People wishing to rent accommodation are often asked to have a guarantor. A guarantor is a person who undertakes to pay your rent and service charges on your behalf if you are unable to do so. The guarantor may be an individual who is taxable in France (friend, relative, third party) or a legal entity (company, association).
- It should be noted that foreign individuals are almost never accepted as guarantors.

GOOD TO KNOW

The difference between mutual insurance and health insurance: health insurance (social security) is compulsory for all European citizens who do not have a European Health Insurance Card

or for anyone from outside the European Union, it partially reimburses your health expenses. Mutual or health insurance is optional and covers the remaining costs you incur by paying an insurance contribution each month.

 You can register with the French National Health Insurance (Sécurité Sociale) on the Ameli.fr website

IMPORTANT: Remember to update your personal details so that you can benefit from optimum follow-up of your healthcare procedures

• If you work, you are obliged to join your employer's health insurance scheme (unless your contract is short-term). So there's no need to take out a second one.

HOW TO REGISTER FOR HEALTH INSURANCE

FOR A EUROPEAN CITIZEN HOLDING A EUROPEAN HEAITH INSURANCE CARD

- It is not compulsory to register with the health insurance scheme;
- Apply for your European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) from the social security organisation in your home country;

WORKING ALONGSIDE YOUR STUDIES

GOOD TO KNOW

- All students have the right to work while studying in France. French law allows foreign students to work 964 hours a year, which equates to 60% of the legal working time (50% for Algerian students whose status remains defined by the Franco-Algerian agreement of 27 December 1968).
- Algerian students must obtain prior authorisation to work from the Ministry of the Interior: administration-etrangers-en-france.interieur.gouv.fr

up to a maximum of 850 hours' work per year.

- Foreign students from outside the EU must, except under certain conditions (validated by the OPCO), have already spent one year studying in France. A work permit (visa, residence permit, etc.) is required for apprenticeship and professional training contracts.
- Work permits are not required for internships.

DOING CIVIC SERVICE IN FRANCE

GOOD TO KNOW

- Civic service $\$ is a voluntary commitment to a mission of general interest, lasting from 6 to 12 months. Aimed at young people aged 16 to 25, a civic service mission must fall within at least one of the following ten areas, which are recognised as priorities for the nation: solidarity, health, education for all, culture and leisure, sport, the environment, remembrance and citizenship, international development and humanitarian action, emergency crisis intervention and European citizenship.
- To be eligible for civic service, you must have a valid residence permit.

- YOUNG NON-EUROPEANS IN FRANCE FOR LESS THAN 1 YEAR, YOU MUST BE IN POSSESSION OF ONE OF THE FOLLOWING RESIDENCE PERMITS
- Temporary residence permit with student status
- General multi-annual residence permit
- Multiannual residence permit for beneficiaries of subsidiary protection or family members of beneficiaries of subsidiary protection
- Automatic residence permit for foreign nationals recognised as refugees
- Receipt of recognition of international protection issued by Ofpra or by the CNDA

GOOD TO KNOW

Please note that having a civic service contract does not extend the period of validity of your residence permit.

Special case for students in a gap year who are authorised to carry out civic service. A gap year validated by an institution can allow you to renew your residence permit.

GOOD TO KNOW

What is subsidiary protection? A form of protection granted to foreigners who do not meet the criteria for refugee status in France but who can prove the contextual risks they face in their country of origin.

FOR YOUNG NON-EUROPEANS LIVING IN FRANCE FOR MORE THAN A YEAR, YOU MUST HOLD ONE OF THE FOLLOWING RESIDENCE PERMITS:

- Temporary residence permit marked "vie privée et familiale"
- Residence permit marked "passeport talent"
- Residence permit marked "passeport talent famille"
- Residence permit marked "statut d'apatride ou la mention membre de la famille d'un bénéficiaire du statut d'apatride" (beneficiary of stateless status or family member of a beneficiary of stateless status)
- Residence permit marked "résident de longue durée-UE"
- Residence permit.

FOR EUROPEAN CITIZENS

You can do civic service if you are a member of the European Economic Area (EEA), the European Union or Switzerland.


